Officer recommendation as supported by the Cabinet Member:

 That £5,689.00 of developer contribution received through planning obligation 17/00763 Land West of Maidstone Road is allocated and released to Horsmonden Parish Council towards the development of the sports ground at Maidstone Road



1. Introduction and Background

- 1.1 Horsmonden Parish Council are undertaking a project to improve their sports facilities through the provision of a new pavilion. The Borough Council is holding Section 106 funds from the development of Land West of Maidstone Road Horsmonden (17/00763) The terms set out in the associated S106 agreement for the adult and youth recreation contribution are towards improvements to the sports ground at Maidstone Road Horsmonden, for the provision of scoreboards and for the use towards ground improvements and the provision of adult and youth recreation facilities in the village of Horsmonden.
- 1.2 Contributions have been held by Tunbridge Wells Borough Council pending Horsmonden Parish Council and Horsmonden Sports Club identifying a suitable project to allocate funds.
- 1.3 Horsmonden Sports Club appointed a company specialising in the design and management of sports buildings, Sports Clubhouses, who have 35 years' experience in delivering sports pavilions nationwide.
- 1.4 Sports Clubhouses proposal has developed the project in preparation of preapplication submission. The work to include.
 - Consultation with client and all stakeholders
 - Initial feasibility design
 - Design of scheme including plans
 - Design access statement.
 - Consultation with planning during design stage.
- 1.5 This stage of the work is complete. Horsmonden Sports Club sought quotations and appointed the company offering the best value accepting the lowest quote.
- 1.6 Horsmonden Parish Council are seeking the release of £5,689.00 of developer contributions relating to the development of Land West of Maidstone Road Horsmonden as a contribution towards the total cost of the project with grant funding being sought from Sport England for the full cost of the project.

2. Options Considered

2.1 Do nothing the agreement is specific towards the use of the funding, failure to allocate the money will result in the funds being paid back to the developer.

2.2 Agree. The project meets the terms of the S106 agreement and allocate the funds to Horsmonden Parish Council to contribute towards the project costs.

3. Preferred Option and Reason

3.1 The recommended and most durable option is to allocate the funds and contribute towards the development of the sports grounds at Maidstone Road. This project will upgrade the existing facilities and improve the opportunities for youth and adult sport

4. Consultation on Options

4.1 Horsmonden Sports Club working with Horsmonden Parish Council carried out a consultation exercise with local users and club members.

Cross Cutting Issues

A. Legal (including the Human Rights Act)

Planning obligation agreements provide a mechanism for collecting contributions from developers through the planning process. Section 106 contributions may only be used for the purpose specified in the agreement. The report states that the proposed use for the contribution in this instance is in accordance with the terms of the S106 agreement and the funding can be utilised as proposed.

The funds should be released subject to the conditions set out in the S106 agreement being met in full and any necessary agreements or contracts entered into on release of the contributions must be in accordance with the Council's Contract Procedure Rules and should be in a form approved by the Head of the Mid Kent Legal Partnership

Horsmonden Cricket Club have taken into account what they require from the building briefing the architects to make the building energy efficient and cost effective to run. As this will be a new build and subject to planning consent there will be a requirement for a building to be efficient as possible. The club appointed an independent energy consultant to prepare an energy statement, this statement proposes an air source heat pump driven building that scores an A-22 EPC rating. The club will be including a rainwater harvesting solution to sustain water supplies for ground maintenance

J. Health and Wellbeing

Contributing towards the project costs will support the increase of physical activity through providing facilities and opportunities for youth and adult sport. This will encourage physical activity and social interaction for a range of ages which will promote health and wellbeing.
